John Stark Regional High School Students to Compete in District

"We the People: The Citizen and the Constitution", Competition December 6

Students from the 'We the People' class at John Stark Regional High School will compete in this year's district competition at the Legislative Office Building in Concord, NH, on Friday, December 6. The John Stark team will compete against Nashua High School, Milford High and Merrimack Valley. 'We the People' is a national program run by the Center for Civic Education, who hosts the national competition in Washington, DC, in April. This district competition, to be followed by the state competition in January, is a project of the NH Bar Association.

The 'We the People' class taught by Dan Marcus at John Stark is designed to promote civic competence and responsibility among America's youth. The competitions are simulated congressional hearings where the students testify before a panel of judges made up of notable government and political leaders. The students from John Stark prepared four minute responses to three questions prior to the competition, but only one of the questions will be asked. In the next portion of this competition, students will put their notes away and respond to six minutes of follow up questions from the judges.

John Stark students participating in this 'We the People' competition include seniors Carly Cook, Nick Dahl, Andrew Greene, and Connor McDonald; juniors Aliyah Browne, Gage Huard, Hailey Nase, and Jessie Ogood; and sophomore Bryce Moser.

"We are very proud of the performances of our all of our 'We the People' teams from Mr. Marcus' Class and wish this team great success in this next level of competition," said Principal Corkery.

John Stark Regional High School to Host Their First Ever

Model UN Conference on Saturday, December 7, 2013

Area Schools Invited to Participate

John Stark will host our very first Model United Nations conference on Saturday, December 7, with several area high schools attending. Eighth graders from our sending schools in Weare and Henniker will also participate. This first Model UN Conference at John Stark is a Senior Project for Nathaniel Moore. The opening address for the conference will be given by News Director Sarah Ashworth from New Hampshire Public Radio.

Model United Nations is an authentic simulation of the UN General Assembly, UN Security Council, or other multilateral body, which catapults students into the world of diplomacy and negotiation. At a Model UN event, a club sends student delegates to debate the viewpoint of a certain country or a topic. It is meant to reflect the activities of

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the United Nations.

“This is very exciting on so many levels,” said Melissa Muzzy co-student advisor of the JSRHS Model United Nations. “While we participate in several Model UN conferences from Boston University to Plymouth State, we’ve never hosted a conference. The fact that it’s a Senior Project for Nathaniel Moore makes us all very proud,” said Mrs. Muzzy. Nathaniel Moore has facilitated the full scope of this Model UN from conception, to event planning, to gathering and coordinating volunteer assistance. John Stark delegates from Model UN Club who have stepped forward to assist Nate include: Senior Ryan Compagna; Juniors Jessie Osgood and Joseph Muzzy; Sophomores Megan McNally, Nancy Gregory, Gretchen Wagner, and Olivia French. Gabrielle Anderson is the other John Stark advisor to the club.

“One of the goals for this project,” said Nate “is to share this experience with the surrounding schools which may not even have a Model UN Club and never had considered participating in a Model UN Conference.” In that vein, the focus of this John Stark Conference is one of historical perspective, rather than current events. “As a delegate, historical research is easier to complete than current events. There is more available, reliable material delegates can access to research their topic,” continued Moore.

The three topics for the John Stark conference will be: the invasion of Afghanistan by the Soviet Union, the end of Apartheid in South Africa, and the civil war and following the break-up of Yugoslavia.

“There’s recent research out by the Casey Institute at UNH that the percent of children living in poverty in New Hampshire has skyrocketed and, for the very first time, the jump is the largest of any state in the country,” said John Stark teacher Bess Robblee. John Stark & Henniker Community School Participated in the Stand Up to Bullying Rally at UNH

John Stark Students and Henniker Community School students traveled together to attend the state's first STAND UP TO BULLYING rally held at UNH in November. John Stark and HCS students joined thousands of middle and high school students from across New Hampshire to take a stand against all forms of bullying.

The Anti-Defamation League (ADL) Peer Trainers from John Stark and the 7/8th Grade Student Council members from the Henniker Community School were the two groups from SAU 24 schools to participate in this rally. They joined others at the rally in a town hall style discussion on bullying, heard from inspirational speakers, and caucused to exchange ideas and discuss action plans for their schools. "The best way to change one person's negative behavior is to empower the bystanders to step in and say that it's not ok to do that," said John Stark Principal Christopher Corkery. "And," continued Henniker Assistant Principal Karen Raymond, "our students came back with ideas of how we all can continue to take a stand against bullying."

STAND UP, a program of Empower Peace, was started in 2011 with the first event taking place in Boston with more than 4,000 participants. Over 5,000 students and teachers attended last year's

John Stark Quiz Bowl Team

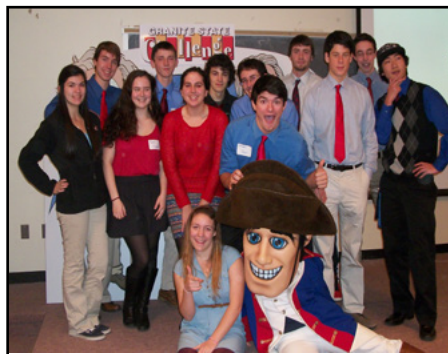

The Quiz Bowl team travelled to Plymouth State University in November to compete in the Granite State Challenge Super Sunday Qualifier. Teams from all over New Hampshire took the qualifying test, but only the top sixteen will compete on this year's Granite State Challenge, televised on New Hampshire Public Television. While only six players were allowed to take the qualifying test, the entire team, plus a JSR Quiz Bowl alumna, came along to support their team and have their own trivia challenge to prepare for their next competition. The General even made an appearance.

The team will also compete in the Vermont-NEA Scholars' Bowl's seventh annual Pre-Holiday Academic Tournament on Friday, December 6, at South Burlington High School in Vermont. (Winning teams from this tournament will qualify for the National Academic Quiz Tournament [NAQT's] in Chicago this spring.) The Vermont-NEA event is New England's largest quiz bowl tournament, and last year's field featured a record 66 teams from Vermont, New York, New Hampshire, and Massachusetts.

In March, the John Stark team will host the New Hampshire Quiz Bowl League's West Regional tournament.

John Stark Regional High School Only Public School in New Hampshire with The Anti-Defamation League's Peer Training Program in Place

A couple of years ago, teachers and students alike decided they wanted to take charge of the school climate at John Stark Regional High School and combat hate speech and bullying. Today that goal has come more and more into focus as a result of the school's participation in *A WORLD OF DIFFERENCE* Institute's Peer Training Program, a program designed to facilitate and maintain positive social changes in schools sponsored by the Anti-Defamation League (ADL). John Stark Regional High School is the only public school in NH that currently has this ADL Peer Training Program in place.

Last year 30 freshman and sophomore students in Gabrielle Anderson's Advisory participated in the 18 hour leadership training with a regional Anti-Defamation League facilitator. These students came back to John Stark having developed leadership, critical thinking, and conflict management skills, all designed to help them address bias-related issues like bullying and cyber-bullying in their school. The students learned to develop safe prevention and response strategies, including ways they can become allies for targeted peers. "The overriding goal of the training program," commented John Stark Teacher and ADL Advisor Gabrielle Anderson, "is to foster positive peer influence to promote a respectful school community."

This year, there are a total of 45 John Stark students who are in the three Anti-Defamation League Advisories, freshman, sophomores, and juniors. Juniors and sophomores who have received the full training are actively working to train the incoming freshman and act as their mentors. These ADL peer trainers will be hosting conversations about bullying and anti-bias education at John Stark and in other SAU 24 schools.

"It's a much stronger message when a student takes the initiative to speak to another student about why what they are saying or doing is unacceptable," said Anderson. "A message from a peer carries a lot more weight. The students have been empowered to see that they - the students, not just teachers - can have a positive impact on the climate of their school by taking that task on more and more each day. "It's their school and they're owning it," continued Anderson.

Educationally Speaking

Did you see the televised Garth Brooks concert this past weekend? Unlike some of his past concerts, this one focused on the artists that most influenced him as a musician. I must admit that I have shared many of the same favorites over the past five decades, but I'm not sure that my debut at the Acoustic Cafe would be enough to launch me into a career in Nashville. Educationally speaking, one sentence he said resonated with me. It went something like this: "My dad always worked two jobs while we were growing up - one to keep the roof over our heads and food on the table, and the other was so that anyone of us who wanted to go to college could afford to go." I'm hoping that this resonates with you as well.

If we are committed as a community to ensure that every student is Career and College Ready, then we need to have conversations about what happens after graduation early and often. The jobs that you and I looked forward to when we were in high school were outsourced or replaced by automation long ago. The jobs our students will need to achieve employment security sufficient to support a family when they are looking back over five decades have not yet been invented. We need to focus our students learning on how to think differently than you and I had to and on how to apply their knowledge in new, more complex, and meaningful ways.

During our eighth grade parents' night presentations this February, we will start the conversation by talking about Advanced Placement (AP) and Running Start classes here at John Stark. We then all need to continue these con-

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versations as we stand on the sidelines at athletic games or as we wait for the curtain to open at the next show. Our community and school board continue to support one of the largest arrays in the region of AP courses, courses that offer Certificates of mastery (like CISCO and Microsoft), and courses that offer college transcripts. These courses come with instant credibility for rigor, and they demonstrate a student's commitment to challenging themselves academically. They also offer a pathway for earning advanced standing in college, or for earning a college degree in fewer years, which can translate directly into savings.

Give the gift of education this holiday season by making time to talk with your children and your neighbor's children about how the choices that they make now are so important to their future and to our community. Plan a college visit for your freshman or take your sophomore to the financial aid presentation on December 12th. It's not just for seniors. Help us help them by ensuring that they understand the value that you place on education.

Finally, I'd like to say thank you for entrusting us with your kids. We see them every day in ways that you may not. They are doing such a great job learning to care, learning to give, and learning to learn. All the best to you and your family this season.
